## Spy vs. Spy Intelligence and Counterintelligence in a Democratic Society

The purpose of this handout is to supplement information you may already received regarding our seminar. We expect the course will evolve as we understand and refine the issues around espionage and democracy. Here is some basic information that will help get us started.

We ask that you read <u>Confessions of a Spy</u> by Pete Earley (Berkley Books, 1998) before the first class. This is the story of Aldrich Ames, one of most notorious spies in U.S. History -- An astonishing, real-life account of a Russian agent.

We also recommend that you look at two films. (1) Based on the 1974 novel by John le Carre, *Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy*, stars Gary Oldman (2011), and (2) *The Lives of Others*, a German film, won the Oscar for Best Foreign Film in 2006. Both films are available on Amazon Prime.
